Suffered Under Pontius Pilate By Pastor Neil Wehmas

There are much that is confessed within the words of the Apostles' Creed. Amongst its one hundred and fifteen words, we will focus upon just four of them during the Lenten season. "Suffered Under Pontius Pilate" are those words.

Why are these words included? Why mention Pontius Pilate and not Caiaphas or someone else? Why are these words important? Why do some church bodies struggle with or even reject these words?

It is quite easy to turn Christianity into a sort of fairy tale or help me feel good type story. It is easy to make whether or not Jesus is true God and true Man a matter of opinion. Much of our culture treats being a Christian the same way the treat being a fan of specific sports team. It is just part of one's personality, it appears.

"Suffered under Pontius Pilate" are words that confess that Jesus is more than opinion or personality. It confesses that Jesus Christ is a man of history. Pontius Pilate is a well-documented figure in the history of the Roman Empire. His inclusion declares that this real life person was intimately involved with Jesus' death by crucifixion. This declares that Jesus is also a real, historical figure. It declares that Jesus suffered, died, buried, and rose from the dead in history. It is not a matter of opinion, but of fact.

During our Lenten series *Suffered Under Pontius Pilate* we will explore the historicity of Jesus of Nazareth who was crucified under the jurisdiction of Pontius Pilate. Each week, we will explore various scriptural passages that point to this history. We will also consider texts outside of the Bible that verify these details.

As C. S. Lewis said, "Christianity, if false, is of no importance, and if true, of infinite importance. The only thing it cannot be is moderately important." Through the Lenten season, leading right up to Easter, we will explore and see that indeed Christianity is historical, factual, and true.

The High School Youth will provide & serve on the 1st Sunday's of the month and the Junior High Youth will provide & serve on the 3rd Sunday of the month.







At the November 2023 meeting of the LWML Executive Board a decision was made about how the LWML Mite box contributions for 2024 would be distributed.



The Four Loves summarizes four kinds of human love--affection, friendship, erotic love, and the love of God. Masterful without being magisterial, this book's wise, gentle, candid reflections on the



virtues and dangers of love draw on sources from Jane Austen to St. Augustine. The chapter on charity (love of God) may be the best thing Lewis ever wrote about Christianity. Consider his reflection on Augustine's teaching that one must love only God. because only God is eternal, and all earthly love will someday pass Who could conceivably begin to love God on such a prudential ground--because the security (so to speak) is better? Who could even include it among the grounds for loving? Would you choose a wife or a Friend--if it comes to that, would you choose a dog--in this spirit? One must be outside the world of love, of all loves, before one thus calculates. His description of

Christianity here is no less forceful and opinionated than in Mere Christianity or The Problem of Pain , but it is far less anxious about its reader's response--and therefore more persuasive than any of his apologetics. When he begins to describe the nature of faith, Lewis "Take it as one man's reverie, almost one man's myth. If anything in it is useful to you, use it: if anything is not, never give it a second thought." -- Michael Joseph Gross

Spring training for Christians

The word Lent comes from Middle English and German words for springtime. In light of the start of baseball season, some people call the pre-Easter season "spring training for Christians." This fresh perspective moves away from the flawed understanding that Lent must be somber, or that giving something up for Lent is punishment for sin or a way to earn God's favor.

As people of faith, we should never take a season off. But every so often — at least once a year! — we do well to examine where we need to get back in shape spiritually. Perhaps we will indeed opt to give something up: that swearing habit, sleeping in on Sundays, or the cost of a weekly treat so we can donate the money instead. Or maybe we'll take on something new for Lent: a Bible study, prayer routine or service project. Hebrews describes spiritual discipline as challenging in the moment but vielding righteousness later. The writer urges us, "Lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees ... so that what is lame may not be put out of joint but rather be healed" (12:11-13, ESV). May the spring training of Lent strengthen and heal us all.

A prayer for Lent

Dear Christ, hasten to me. Release me from my sins. Free my arms from the chains of evil, that I may embrace you. Lift the scales of ignorance from my eyes that I may see you. Why do you delay? What are you waiting for? You are my God and my Lord, you are my refuge and strength, you are my glory and my hope. In you I put my trust. Dear Christ, hasten to me.



CROSS OF ASHES — On Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, worshipers' foreheads are often marked with ashes in the sign of the cross. The ashes traditionally come from burning palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. In the Old Testament, ashes were a sign of mourning and repentance. Today, some worshipers wipe off the ashes before leaving church, to symbolize being cleansed from sin by Jesus' death; others wear the ashes the rest of the day, carrying the cross of Christ into the world. Reciting Genesis 3:19 often accompanies the placement of ashes: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return."



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
