

Start Every Day

"In the Name of the Father, and + of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen"

recite APOSTLE'S CREED Read Catechism—What do you believe according to these words?

I believe that when the called ministers of Christ deal with us by His divine command, in particular when they exclude openly unrepentant sinners from the Christian congregation and absolve those who repent of their sins and want to do better, this is just as valid and certain, even in heaven, as if Christ our dear Lord dealt with us Himself.

VERSE: Genesis 1:1 "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth."

PRAYER of the WORD

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, without Your help our labor is useless, and without Your light our search is in vain. Invigorate our study of Your holy Word that, by due diligence and right discernment, we may establish ourselves and others in Your holy faith; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

- Read *Psalm 12* (The faithful have vanished.)
- Read *The Gospel According to Mark,* Chapter 12

Monday, January 13

- Read **Psalm 13** (How Long, O LORD?)
- Read *The Gospel According to Mark,* Chapter 13

ORIGEN (185-254AD): Just as bodies become sick before their death if they do not suffer violence from without, and in all cases the way of separation of soul from body comes through weakness, so it happens with the whole course of the world creation. When the creation begins to decay, having as it



has both beginning and end, it must grow weak before its dissolution. At this point the earth may be frequently shaken with earthquakes. The air having received some diseased contagion may become overrun with pestilence. Moreover the vital energies of the earth itself may suddenly fail and strangle its fruits. These destructive forces may pollute the regenerative capacity of all trees. COMMENTARY ON MATTHEW 34.1

Tuesday, January 14

- Read *Psalm 14* (The fool says in his heart, there is no God.)
- Read *The Gospel According to Mark,* Chapter 14

IRENAEUS (135-202AD): Giving directions to his disciples to offer to God the first fruits of his creatures—not as if he stood in need of them, but that they might be themselves neither unfruitful nor ungrateful—he took that created thing, bread, and gave thanks, and said, "This is my body." And the cup likewise, which is part of the creation to which we belong, he confessed to be his blood, and taught the new offering of the

new covenant. This is what the church has received from the apostles and throughout the whole world offers to God, who affords us nourishment as the first fruits of his gifts in the New Testament. AGAINST HERESIES 4.17.5.²

Wednesday, January 15

- Read **Psalm 15** (O LORD, who shall dwell on your holy hill?)
- Read The Gospel of Mark, Chapter 15-16 AUGUSTINE (354-430AD): This silence of our Lord Jesus Christ took place more than once. It occurred before the chief priest, and before Herod, and before Pilate himself. So it was not in vain that the prophecy regarding him had preceded: "As the lamb before its shearer was dumb, so he opened not his mouth,"17 especially on those occasions when he did not answer his questioners. Usually he replied to questions addressed to him, but in this case he declined to make any reply. The metaphor of the lamb is used to indicate that his silence does not imply guilt but innocence. When he did not open his mouth as he

AMBROSE (333-397AD): The cause of envy was the happiness of man placed in paradise, because the devil could not brook the favors received by man. His envy was aroused because man, though formed in slime, was chosen to be an inhabitant of paradise. The devil began to reflect that man was an inferior creature yet had hopes of an eternal life, whereas he, a creature of superior nature, had fallen and had become part of this mundane existence. - Read *Psalm 17* (The shadow of your wings.)
- Read *Genesis*, *Chapters 4-6*

EPHREM THE SYRIAN (306-373AD): But Cain was filled with wrath instead of compunction. To him who knows all, who asked him about his brother in order to win him back, Cain retorted angrily and said, "I do not know, am I my brother's keeper?" ... What then would you say, Cain? Should Justice take vengeance for the blood that cried out to it? Or not? Did it not delay so that you might repent? Did Justice not distance itself from its own knowledge and ask you as if it did not know, so that you might confess? What it said to you did not please you, so you came to that sin to which it had warned you beforehand not to come. COMMENTARY ON GENESIS 3.6.1; 3.7.1.5

- Read Psalm 18 (The LORD is my rock and fortress.)
- Read *Genesis*, *Chapters 7-9*

Justin Martyr (100-165AD): "God closed the ark of Noah from without." You should not imagine that the unbegotten God himself descended or ascended from any place. For the ineffable Father
